Looking Back, Looking Forward

The Church of the Advent is a body rich in diversity comprised of wonderful folks variously trying to discern and respond to God's call. Success is measured not by the world's standards but by faithfulness often more nebulous than luminous, but faith nonetheless, real honest-to-God faith. What we do to draw nearer to God and deepen our life in community are essentially what early Christians did according to the Evangelist Luke in Acts 2:42: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." Think about that in the context of our life together, and you likely will agree that God's Spirit is at work in us.

The average Sunday attendance in an Episcopal parish is 24.

That's our average, smaller than we'd like but not below average. If everyone who attends regularly was present on a given Sunday, there would be twice that number. We are small but are not too small to

make a difference. We need to grow. In fact, we have added some new members, but lost some as well. I am convince that the key to growth is evidence that we are a community activated by love for love, so earnestly giving ourselves over to love and making a difference in the lives of our neighbors that we become a vital force for the growth and welfare of our community. It is good and right to fling open our doors, extending genuine hospitality by welcoming our neighbors. But we need to realize that God needs us in the mission field that is entered as we go out through the door.

This past year, Kit Reddick has led our efforts to give comfort and relief to our neighbors. Among the

ways we have touched the lives of others through outreach are by participating in Blessings in a Backpack and contributing to other programs that fight hunger. We provided Christmas gifts to children, and, at other times when a need was made known, gathered essentials for children and adults. We tried an initiative to add to some Christmas cheer for youngsters by a reading of a time-honored Christmas story and presenting simple refreshments and gifts. It was not well-attended, but we may try again. Frankie Biggs collected and sent in our annual United Thank Offering pledges.

Music has not only enhanced worship but also has been an instrument of outreach. The process of upgrading the organ, with the vestry's ongoing support, has opened up many new opportunities. The highlight, orchestrated by Brandon Woody with the assistance of Kim Fay and the full participation of our choir and other musicians, was last spring's presentation of a wonderful cantata. Another event showcasing the instrument's improved capability was an organ recital. Addressing the need for voice instruction for area children, Brandon, again assisted by Kim, has begun to teach music to about a half dozen young choristers. The children thrilled us with their angelic voices as they joined the parish choir at a recent evensong. Several of our members have provided suppers and helped in other ways to support the music school. The program shows promise of expanding in scope and size. As liturgist, Brandon regularly meets with me to plan appropriate liturgy for celebrating special occasions. We are hoping to provide

a diversity of music and feature our accomplished instrumental musicians often. Our trumpeter Kim Fay creates a festive mood with her talented playing. Bob Greene's lovely rendition of "Silent Night" is a Christmas tradition. And, now that we have heard Michael Biondi on the guitar at his grandson's baptism, we hope we will hear more from him.

Eucharistic ministers, worship leaders and those offering reflections, lectors and ushers serve faithfully, and trained Eucharistic visitors are ready to call on persons who want home communion. The Altar Guild, under the direction of Lori Taylor, tends the altar, chancel and sanctuary with devotion and hard work. They also provide everything needed to transform the pavilion at Trinity, the altar or other designated space at Green Acres and various venues into sacred space for worship. John Price and Johnny Miller are master floral arrangers.

Soon to come will be an expanded role for Jane Chapman Jernigan. In response to the accolades about her reflections during Morning Prayer, I asked Bishop Skirving to license Jane as preacher. His consent means that she is permitted to preach during Holy Eucharist while I celebrate.

Jim Allen is particularly sensitive about and responsive to the pastoral needs of parishioners and has formed relationships with several whose presence among us we miss. He also has taken on the task of identifying potential security risks and will determine what remedies may warrant attention.

We grieve the loss of any member who has died or can no longer be with us. Lucia Peel's death has been especially difficult. We have not yet figured out how to tend to all the things she did, but we are trying to be creative as we make adjustments. Kit has convened a group, and some persons already have stepped in and ably managed important aspects of parish life. Fellowship is happening, and it's a wonderful thing! Our new model is having a point person for each occasion, and hope that people will step forward. The point person would organize everything start to finish by delegating, and, if there is insufficient interest in helping, that event would not happen. As ECW representative, Kit is willing to take the lead in organizing those who readily volunteer to host receptions after funerals as has been a customary function of ECW.

Lowell Taylor and his team are indispensable. Lowell has given us his accounting and broader financial expertise for many years, and has not asked for remuneration. The vestry is determined to rectify that and has asked Lowell to present a proposal that at the very least accounts for costs to his firm that properly should be assumed by the Advent.



Thanks to Chloe Tuttle and Brandon Woody, we have new and improved web and Facebook pages. Take a look. Joe Jernigan is keeping us informed with "Comings and Goings," rocking the same type of humor that Lucia popularized. Joe manages all administrative responsibilities of the parish such as assigning worship participants and getting volunteers as needed for funerals and other occasions. He takes charge of compiling and printing service bulletins, calendars, rosters and other materials. Kit dedicates much time and attention to collecting and posting information, submitting and editing entries in the monthly *Advent Advisor*. Yes indeed, communications is humming!

We are fortunate to have the unwavering commitments of Senior Warden Doug Chesson and Junior Warden Michael Biondi. I am impressed with Michael's balancing the oversight of Building and Grounds and his personal responsibilities with his determination to attract others to his English as a Second Language Class. I benefit greatly from Doug's wise counsel, especially as it pertains to diocesan interface. He is a strong, decisive leader with a heart for ministry. Among other things, Doug is exploring with others the possibility of broadening options for reverently committing the remains of the deceased in our Memorial Garden.

We are abundantly blessed by the God of love. We are blessed to be a community where love is apparent. I am blessed to be part of the life and ministries of this wonderful community that is the Church of the Advent.

Based on the medieval vigil service, this service was first instituted at Truro Cathedral in England.




The service consists of a procession, bidding prayer with the Lord's Prayer, Invitatory Hymn, nine lessons followed by appropriate carols and hymns, closing prayer, benediction, and hymn.

The service begins with the traditional opening hymn "Once in Royal David's City," calling the congregation to the story of the salvation as a story teller might with "Once upon a time..."

The lessons then go on to retell the story of the salvation with the musical selections emphasizing the previous readings.

The music includes congregation hymns, choir anthems, and instrumental music.


Do not put checks in the offering plate.


On Sunday, December 10 at 7:30 p.m., the Chancel Choir will lead the congregation in a Moravian Love Feast and Candlelight Service at the First United Methodist Church. Kit Reddick and Brandon Woody are participating in the choir.

Looking to January

On Saturday, January 6, 2024 at 6 p.m. the members of our Choir School will lead our Feast of Lights Epiphany Pageant.

For those unfamiliar with it, the Feast of Lights Epiphany pageant is a traditional Christian celebration that commemorates the visit of the Magi (the three wise men) to the baby Jesus in Bethlehem. It is often held in Episcopal and Anglican churches and involves a dra-

matic reenactment of the biblical story. During the pageant, participants dress up as characters from the Nativity story, including Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the Magi, and angels. The Magi are central figures, as they bring gifts to honor the newborn Jesus.



The Feast of Lights part of the celebration refers to the use of candles and lights to symbolize the spiritual significance of this event, often incorporating the lighting of candles and singing of hymns. The pageant serves as a way to retell the story of Jesus’ birth and to emphasize the theme of light and revelation, as the term Epiphany signifies the revelation of Jesus to the world. It is a beautiful and meaningful tradition that helps people reflect on the Christian belief in the incarnation of God in human form and the message of hope and salvation that Jesus brings.

Please join us as we rejoice, reflect, and give thanks for the light that guides us on our own spiritual journeys. We look forward to celebrating the Feast of Lights Epiphany Pageant with you..

The traditional Twelfth Night Party to raise funds for Blessings in a Backpack will be on Saturday, January 6 following the Feast of Lights Service — from around 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. — at the home of Cathy Skinner.



Like Wise Men bringing gifts to the baby Jesus, we will be asked to bring our gifts of monetary support for the children of Martin County who are served by Blessings in a Backpack.

In 2024 the Church of the Advent will partner with the First United Methodist Church to pack during the months of January and May. Recognizing that we both are small churches, we are consolidating our volunteer numbers.

The costs for Blessings in a Backpack have increased due to increase cost of food and increase number of children being served. Cost per child per meal is now \$4.13 from \$2.78. Consider the following to guide you in your giving:

- \$20.00 feeds one child for one month
- \$40.00 feeds one children for two months
- \$60.00 feeds three children for one month
- \$80.00 feeds four children for two months
- \$100.00 feeds five children for one month
